My Readers

Authors all want their books to sell well. But authors also want readers to enjoy their books. The first step in meeting both these objectives, naturally, is having a book whose content and style people will find pleasing, interesting, exciting, etc. But the next step is making people aware that the book exists, and that others who have read it have good things to say.

There are professional book reviewers, and their reviews are important. But there are so many books that could be reviewed, and only a few of them will end up being selected by reviewers. And, let's face it, first time authors are unknown quantities. Will a reviewer commit time to a book by one of these authors? Some will, but it can be a crap shoot.

On the other hand, there are readers.

Readers of books are an amazing bunch.

They have a huge range of tastes, they know what they like, and they can respond in the most positive, gratifying ways when they find what they do like.

Are the comments of friends and acquaintances a good indication of the quality, the appeal of a book? Some people say no, that friends will just tell an author what he or she would like to hear.

I disagree.

If a friend doesn't like your book, or is indifferent to it, they tend just not to say anything. But if they do like your book, many will say so, and in terms that reflect pretty closely in just which ways they liked it.

An author can't be, and shouldn't be, shy about blowing his or her own horn, but this has to be done in a way that's useful to potential readers.

I have received some astonishing review comments from friends and acquaintances. A few of these comments appear below.
